collect and produce statistics on.
Data on property title (strata title, community title, unit title) in the 2026 Census.
The Census currently allows for accurate capture of information about private apartment residents. While most private apartments will be strata titled, not all are. More importantly, many strata titled properties are not apartments. While there are just over 2.5 million private apartment residents in Australia according to the last Census, by our estimates there are more than 1.3 million additional strata residents living in other dwelling types.
We propose the addition of one question to the 2026 Census:
'Is this dwelling part of a strata title, community title or unit title development (with a body corporate or owners corporation)?'

The ability to accurately capture this information would allow governments, researchers and industry and community organisations to match demographic data to strata properties, providing a clearer picture of the strata sector in Australia and support the delivery of targeted outcomes.

Assessment criteria:

The ABS uses a range of criteria to assess whether it includes topics in the Census or surveys. This includes the need for the data, the ability and willingness of the public to respond and how easy it is to collect the information. Your response to this question will help with our assessment regarding the need for the data. The specific criteria we will be looking for you to address in your submission are:

- a. The topic is of current national importance.
- b. There is a need for data at the national level, and either the local level or for small population groups.
- c. There is likely to be a continuing need for data on the topic following the Census.

The topic is of current national importance. Strata properties form a large and growing proportion of housing stock in Australia. In 2020, there were approximately 2.5 million residential strata properties in the country¹.

Since 2018, the peak body for the strata sector in Australia, Strata Community Association, have funded the City Futures Research Centre at UNSW to collate land titles data from all states and territories, standardise and clean this data, and report on the scale of strata properties nationally. This report is widely used by government, industry and community associations to raise the profile of the strata sector, and advocate for the needs of strata residents. However, major limitations of the report are that it is not possible to accurately link property titling information with demographic information, and that the information is not freely available at a local level.

There is a need for data at the national level and the local level. It is currently not possible to seamlessly link titling information with demographic characteristics. The value of the topic is enhanced through combining with other characteristics collected in the Census. A more accurate picture of who lives in strata title would be achieved by cross tabulating our proposed question with collected household characteristics data. Local level information is essential for planning local service provision and programs to meet the needs of strata residents.

There will be a continuing need for data on the topic following the Census. This continuing need is evidenced by funding of the Australasian Strata Insights Report by the Strata Community Association over multiple years (2018, 2020, 2022). Providing information via the Census would be a more accurate and straightforward solution to this data need. Considering the growth in strata titled properties in Australia, the data collected will have enduring value.

Alternative data sources on property title are increasingly difficult to deliver. The Strata Insights Reports need to utilise multiple data sources that have different degrees of reliability and cannot be directly compared. Inclusion of a question on strata title in the Census would allow for accurate linking of titling and demographic information at a local level.

Since the delivery of the 2020 Strata Insights report, it has also become difficult and expensive to negotiate access to the land titles data from land titles agencies in the states on NSW, WA and SA, where land title data holdings have been privatised.

Data on the topic can be collected efficiently. We are proposing the addition of a single question, which can efficiently collect data on different types of property title and allow for enhanced use of the existing Census:

The design of this question has regard to a similar question asked in the United States National Housing Survey ('Is this XXXX part of a condominium?') ²
A representative of the household would be willing and able to answer questions on the topic. Property owners will be aware that their property is owned under strata title. Renters should have been provided with strata by-laws and the contact details of a strata manager (if one is employed) and therefore should be aware. The question includes all terms used to define/describe strata title across states and territories (strata, community and unit title). We have also recommended the inclusion of "(with a body corporate or owners corporation)" to further clarify the meaning of the question for residents. We have proposed that an 'unsure' option be provided in the question for people who remain unsure. Information on the number of people who respond 'unsure' will also be of value to the strata sector in understanding the level of community literacy on strata title and its implications.
